Annual Fund Report

On May 1, 2012, we sent 442 annual appeal requests to Summer School families and friends. Several appeal letters were mailed to the many donors who live near SPSS, while the rest were mailed to donors who live in 30 states and 7 foreign countries during the winter months. As the fiscal year draws to a close, we are pleased to report that we have received 120 donations. Ninetythree donors increased their gifts this year, or made a donation after having missed a year or two. A family from England and several recent college graduates sent in their first donations. One young woman sent \$10 and a note stating, "Go SPSS!" Fourteen families sustained their yearly contributions and

13 families decreased their donation amount. Unfortunately, 19 request letters were returned without any forwarding information. As of October 31, 2012, we are excited to share with you that we are nearing our goal of \$30,000. To all of you who gave to the Annual Fund, we THANK YOU. Your gift helps to sustain facilities, programs, and staffing.
